### The Election, Thanksgiving, and Ezekiel

As I'm writing this, it feels like we've been in Ezekiel for as long as... well... at least as long as we were in Jeremiah. Three days to go before we enter the Apocalyptic world of Daniel and then the dysfunctional-family world of Hosea. It's obvious by now that the intended readers of Jeremiah and Ezekiel did not have the aversion to repetition that 21st Century readers have.

That being said, there is a curious repetition in Ezekiel that even the biggest fans of text-messaging, bullet-points, Cliff Notes, and Executive Summaries can appreciate: Ezekiel's stubborn insistence on calling human rulers PRINCES and not KINGS. You ask: Why princes and not kings? Good question! During Israel/Judah's tumultuous history, she had the nasty habit of trying to look like the nations around her, ditching her God-given distinctiveness for a quasi-national-ecumenism. (No, I don't get paid by the word, why do you ask?) Two examples from Israel/Judah's history stand out: when the people asked Samuel for a king and when David (and later Solomon) set out to build God a temple. God warned his people about the dangers of a king, and made a strong case for why he didn't need a temple. In God's economy, Judges and the Tabernacle would do just fine. But no matter, his people were going to have a king for themselves and a temple for God.

In refusing to call human dignitaries, rulers and authorities "kings," Ezekiel drives home the point that God alone is the sovereign potentate of his people. His people dare not ascribe the power, authority, and honor due God to one of their own, nor seek the same for themselves.

Where are you going with this, Pastor? Two directions are possible. One would be to offer a commentary on the election of 2012, and how the only vote that matters was the one cast by Christ on the cross whereby he became our king for all time. But you're probably as sick as I am at anything to do with politics. So, instead, we'll go in the other direction and focus on the holiday that happens at the end of the month: Thanksgiving.

After coming to the "New World," the Pilgrims celebrated what became our holiday of Thanksgiving. As Christian refugees, they recognized that it was

God, and not the state or their own genius that had provided for their physical (and spiritual) needs. They recognized that God is king—a king whose governance provided for them in the voyage to and life in the New World.

As we approach Thanksgiving, I ask you to consider two things: first, is everything the Lord has blessed you with (beginning with the most important thing of all: salvation through Jesus Christ); but also recognize and honor him as King, the ruler of heaven and earth, for time and eternity.

#### **Notes From the Preschool**


