Pastor's Corner

Jesus is our Great Physician

"I am the Lord, your healer" Exodus 15:26

Recently the famous statue of *Christ the Redeemer* in Rio de Janeiro had an image of a doctor's uniform imposed upon it in gratitude for all the medical workers who are assisting during the current pandemic. It seems common for us to see as heroes those who are helping us. After 9/11, firefighters and other first responders were honored, rightly so, as heroes in our country. During the lengthy wars in Afghanistan & Iraq, those who served in the Armed Forces were honored in our country. Today, medical workers of all kinds are being respected.

Those who imposed a doctor's uniform upon the statue meant to honor the human workers who are attempting to curb this virus. Mission Moment: Promoting Zion's Internal, Local, and International Missionary Efforts

Dearly Beloved,

Blessed Eastertide in this uncertain, unprecedented, and often unsettling time for human flesh in our world in the face of COVID-19 pandemic / storm. May you be found blessed in the Lord's care. May your family and all of your loved ones be weathering this temporal storm and holding fast to the faith bestowed to us by our Resurrected and Victorious Lord. Amen!

As you might have observed my last few reports have focused more precisely on COVID-19 with all its effects on JEM Lutheran Seminary life here, and this will be no different as we are still in this uncertain period. Thirteen students who are stuck as a result of the strict lockdown are presently living with me in my one restroom house with no running water or power. The remaining 38 from other parts of the country are in the Seminary dorm but regularly visit my house for at least one meal per day since seminary funds are depleted and the Rector is in Lagos. I am the only one on ground here to care for them.

I can only imagine how you must feel as you seek patience and wisdom to persevere through this storm in your lives. ... Yet again, all is in God's hands and His ways are not our ways. My dearly beloved family of supporters, join me to take all of this to our Lord in prayer: "Thou, whose Almighty Word chaos and darkness heard, and took their flight; be Thou my beloved supporters' guardian and guide, and hear them when they call. Let not our slippery footsteps become an obstacle to our prayers. Hear us, we humbly pray, as the Coronavirus continues to threaten us, not only with its perilous spiritual temptation, but also with starvation. Lord, may there be light soon at the end of the tunnel! Thou, who didst come to bring - on Thy redeeming Wings- healing and sight, health to the sick in mind, sight to the blind, bearing the lamp of grace, in earth's darkest place, we fall on our knees. Hear us, lest this awful doom of Coronavirus persist, and discourage even Your faithful servants. Lord, in Your mercy: hear us! We pray this in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen!

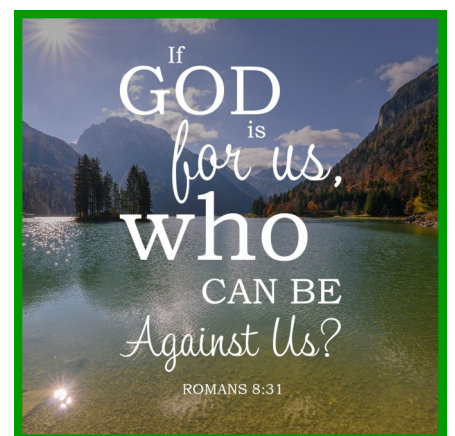
Chairman's Report

I hope you feel good about the unique manner in which Pastor chose to approach the service conundrum by increasing the number of services and in effect to limit the number of attendees to respect the guidelines, yet keep our commitment to providing the sacraments intact. I'm not a theologian, but, I do think while the Gospel is to be a public pronouncement, the Lord's Supper, in our LCMS doctrine, isn't something that is to be casually administered, yet, it is certainly to be offered as much as possible in our church settings. So far, we've done a nice job keeping that faithfully. I hope you appreciate the efforts of Pastor and your Elders in keeping Zion a rock, a cornerstone.

Let me say, on behalf of the Council and Officers, we certainly appreciate and would like to recognize the efforts of our Preschool Director, Tracey Harris. Tracey contacted the parents of all of Zion's Preschool children, many of whom offered to donate their remaining tuition payments so the Preschool teachers and staff will be paid for the rest of the fiscal/school year!!! Our employees are exempt from paying into the unemployment system and are not eligible to collect unemployment under the normal statues, so these donations were extremely beneficial for our staff. Thanks to all involved in this effort and management of this situation. The generosity of our Preschool families is a reflection of the wonderful relationships forged between our Preschool staff and families. In addition, because of Tracey's efforts and the donations of our parents, we will not need to apply for paycheck protection "loans" through the government's recently enacted CARES Act.

Your Church Council has met using the Zoom app, as has the Budget Committee. While online meetings are useful, they're not entirely perfect; however, we're adapting as necessary. One issue we'll be faced with in the coming months is how to convene a Voter's Assembly to conduct the important business of the congregation. I may have more to communicate on this matter in the June Newsletter.

Until then, please keep supporting your church at Zion and pray diligently for the people of the world, the Christian Church on Earth, your Lutheran Church on Earth, and Zion. Take care of yourselves and try to attend a service if you are able. Partake of the sacraments and enjoy the sound of the music we lift up to the Lord regardless of how many are present to sing. Watch online and know that the Easter Season leads to Pentecost and the promise of salvation. Thank you for your determined effort and love for Zion. God is with us, who can be against us...?

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PALM DEVOTION

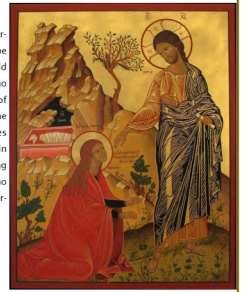

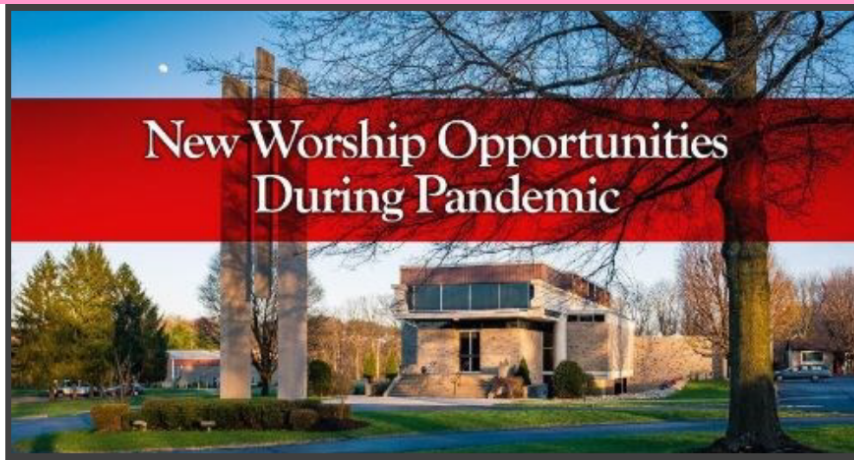
We're looking for volunteers to work with Brent Miller, our webmaster and media technician, on live-streaming our worship services, then editing and publishing them online.

With the extension of pandemic restrictions into May, Zion will continue to offer two shortened, spoken Divine Services each week. These services will complement our already scheduled Wednesday evening service and two Sunday services and are being offered for our members whose medical conditions or age would make them more susceptible to the effects of the coronavirus.

- Services will be held from 10-10:30 am on Thursdays & Saturdays.
- A MAXIMUM number of 10 persons will occupy the sanctuary at any given time (8 worshippers, 1 pastor, 1 elder). Congregational members will be seated by the elder in “reserved” areas in the sanctuary to maximize safe distance between worshippers

This will take you to the Zion Worship Sign-Up page where you can choose a service date). Or, you may call Susie Bishop at 412-977-9066 to sign up.
- Communion will be offered to individuals/families as separate units in order to maintain a safe distance. An offering plate will be available in the narthex rather than passed

More human beings died in abortions than any other cause of death in 2019, a new report indicates...

A heartbreaking reminder about the prevalence of abortion, statistics compiled by Worldometers indicate that there were over 42.3 million abortions world-wide in 2019. The independent site collects data from governments and other reputable organizations and then reports the data, along with estimates and projections, based on those numbers. When contrasting the abortion numbers to other causes of death, including cancer, HIV/AIDS, traffic accidents, and suicide, abortions far outnumbered every other cause. By contrast, 8.2 million people died from cancer in 2019, 5 million from smoking, 13 million from disease, and 1.7 million died from HIV/AIDS. Deaths by malaria and alcohol are also recorded. Worldometers estimates about 58.6 million deaths worldwide in 2019, but that number does not include unborn babies' abortion deaths. Unborn babies are not recognized as human beings even though biology indicates that they are unique, living human beings from the moment of conception and they die brutal, violent deaths in abortions ...

Each of those 42 million abortions represents a living human being whose life was violently destroyed in his or her mother's womb ... In most cases, the unborn babies' hearts are beating when they are aborted, too.

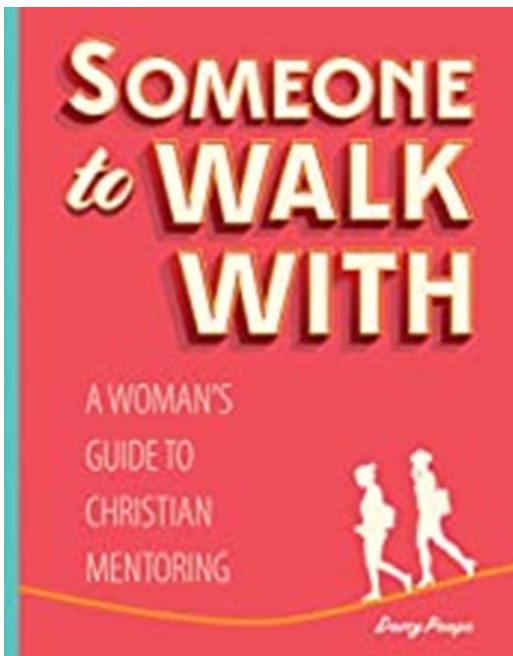

Campaign Update

We have been blessed to receive **\$19,153.29** as of April 28th in our **Forward in Faith Kitchen Campaign** fund! Thank you to all those who have supported this campaign with your financial contributions, time or talents!

You may remember that our initial campaign goal was to raise \$75,000 by May 1st. This would have enabled us to begin the upgrade work this summer. As you might expect, in recent weeks the pandemic has affected our fundraising capability, as well as factors such as the scheduling of contractors. Therefore, the committee has decided that it is necessary to postpone the kitchen upgrade project until the summer of 2021. This will give us ample time to raise the remaining \$55,000, and to plan using a revised schedule for contractors and church/preschool events.

Again, we appreciate your continued support of this campaign. While upgrading our church kitchen is certainly not “essential” right now given the instability created by the pandemic, it is a project that, when done prudently, will provide numerous blessings for Zion members and visitors alike.

What About...

Christian Families

Greetings to you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Christian families face enormous pressures in our world today. It is important that they have a good understanding of what God intends for the family and how they best can respond to the many challenges that confront them.

What does God say about families in His Word, the Bible?

In the beginning, God created men and women to live together with one another as husbands and wives, and through their marriages to bring children into the world. We read in Gen.2:22–24: “The Lord God made a woman from the rib He had taken out of the man, and He brought her to the man. The man said, ‘This is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called “woman,” for she was taken out of man.’ For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and they will become one flesh.” Our Lord Jesus Christ affirmed the divine institution of marriage during his earthly ministry (Matt.19:5).

Through the Apostle Paul, the Lord revealed that Christian husbands and wives are to love and serve one another, modeling before the world the love Christ has for His bride, the church. In Ephesians 5, St. Paul wrote: “Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ. Wives, submit to your husbands as to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, His body, of which He is the Savior.

“Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything. Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave Himself up for her to make her holy.... In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. After all, no one ever hated his own body, but he feeds and cares for it, just as Christ does the church—for we are members of His body.

“ ‘For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh.’ This is a profound mystery—but I am talking about Christ and the church. However, each one of you also must love his wife as he loves himself, and the wife must respect her husband” (Eph.5:21–33).

In this powerful description of marriage, there is no room for husbands to “lord it over” their wives, nor for wives to disregard their husband’s role of “headship” in the home. The key is mutual submission to and love for one another, modeled after Christ’s love for the church, and the church’s submission to Christ her Lord.

Parents are to provide discipline to their children with love and compassion, doing what is best for their children. We read in Eph.6:4: “Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord.” And children are to honor and obey their parents, as the Lord commands, “Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right.’ ‘Honor your father and your mother’—which is the first commandment with a promise—that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth” (Eph.6:1–3).

What are some of the cultural trends impacting families? As we review what the Bible has to say about families, we quickly realize how far many of our cultural trends are from God’s will for families.

Christian families are bombarded by signals which contradict God’s Word. Popular culture—through movies, music, magazines, books and especially television—inundates us with wrong messages. The signal is sent that a sexual relationship outside of marriage, or before marriage, is perfectly natural, or that even a homosexual lifestyle is merely an alternative to “traditional” marriage. Children are led to believe that being disobedient and disrespectful to parents is normal, even amusing, or that the elderly are to be viewed as a burden, or subjects for humor. So much of popular culture appeals to humanity’s most sinful inclinations, and encourages them in a barrage of images and words.

The pressure on our children—particularly our teenagers—to do whatever is necessary to be “popular” among their friends is sometimes difficult for parents to understand and appreciate. Our young people are often caught up in destructive lifestyles and behaviors, encouraged by popular music, which encourages rebelliousness and disdain for life and the dignity of their fellow human beings.

Christian Families

As our teenagers grow older, they are given the impression that “living together” without marriage is perfectly acceptable. How tragic it is when their own families do nothing to resist this behavior!

Men in our culture are encouraged to indulge their lusts and selfish desires. So little respect or attention is given to the man who wishes to be a faithful husband or father. How many children today grow up without a loving and responsible father in the home? The horrendous consequences of this trend will only become greater as we move into the future.

Women too are pressured to take a dim view of what God has given them. They are pressured to view childbearing as less than fulfilling, something perhaps only to be tolerated, and not to be enjoyed as a gift from God. They too face temptations to disregard God’s expectations for them when they are wives and mothers, or to view marriage as something to be abandoned when it becomes inconvenient for them.

Yes, we surely do recognize that popular cultural trends often convey messages totally contrary to our Lord’s Word and His will for Christian families. This needs to be recognized and resisted.

What can a Christian family do to deal with the challenges of our day?

Openly facing the issues is the first step. Pretending that problems do not exist will certainly not help. Nor will it do for a family simply to hope that they will not be faced with problems. Ignoring reality will not make it go away.

It is crucial for Christian parents to spend both quality and quantity time with their children. Reading with their young children, discussing the questions they have and being there to support and encourage them is extremely important.

Husbands and wives need to take time out of busy and hectic schedules to simply talk to one another, discussing the needs they have and the problems they are experiencing, working together to grow in their love for one another, and for their children. More importantly, Christians need to pray for the Lord’s blessing on their marriages and families, asking God to forgive them for their sins and failures as parents and spouses, and then turning to the Lord’s mercy through their

Savior Jesus Christ. Christian families need to make every-Sunday worship an absolute priority. As families are gathered by God around His Word and Sacraments, they receive forgiveness, life and salvation—the strength they need to cope with the challenges of daily life.

What role do daily devotions have in the life of the Christian family?

One of the most important things a family can do is spend time together in the Word of God. Key ingredients for the family’s devotional time are the Scriptures, the hymnal and the Small Catechism. These are excellent resources for meaningful time together in the Word of God. Parents should begin reading and reciting the chief parts of the Small Catechism with their children when they are very young, helping them learn the Lord’s Prayer, the Ten Commandments and the Apostles’ Creed, and then working on the explanations, building as time goes on. Parents need to discuss their faith with their children, pray with them and encourage their children in love to do what is right, not hesitating to say “no” when necessary. And always, parents will want to be for their children a model of the Heavenly Father’s love in Christ Jesus our Lord.

How can parents help their children resist temptations?

Parents often overlook the very important role they play simply by the way they themselves handle life. A parent can provide an important role model for his or her children. If a man constantly displays a harsh and fierce temper at home, uses foul language and acts disrespectfully toward his wife, it is little wonder why his son would grow up with similar attitudes and behaviors. If a woman constantly gripes and points out every fault, again, there is little surprise when her children do the same when they grow up. Christian parents need to model the faith, both to their children and others around them. St. Paul wrote that a Christian marriage is to be an image of Christ’s love for the church. This is both an awesome responsibility and a joyous privilege. May God bless our families richly with His loving mercy, strengthening them as they seek to love one another and serve their Lord and Savior.
