#### Pastor's Corner

#### **Fervent Love**

We give thanks to You, almighty God, that You have refreshed us through this salutary gift, and we implore You that of Your mercy You would <u>strengthen us</u> through the same in faith toward You and <u>in fervent love toward one another</u>; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

-- Post-communion prayer

Do you recognize the prayer above? We pray this after we have communion. Not only do we give thanks to God for the Lord's Supper and ask God to strengthen us in the faith (something you would expect from communion), but there is another element in the prayer above which sticks out a bit. We also pray that through this meal of holy communion God would "strengthen us . . . in fervent love toward one another." In other words, the Lord's Supper is not just about the body and blood of Christ (which we usually concentrate upon almost exclusively). Aside from receiving the Real Presence of Christ, we also pray that through this presence of Christ, we might be strengthened in showing fervent love to one another.

Christianity is unique because of the love we show one another. I know that may sound a bit cliché, and other religions may say they also show love to one another. But Christianity is truly unique in the type of love we show to each other. The love we share amongst each other is not rooted in ourselves, but in

Christ. The love we show each other is not dependent upon the emotions we have on any given day, our love is rooted in Christ. Our love is not fickle, coming and going depending upon circumstances. Instead, our love is rooted in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ who is still coming to us every day through His Word and sacraments. Jesus is coming to show us how much He loved us by dying on a cross for each and every one of us. It is from out of this sacrificial love of Christ that we Christians are to imitate a sacrificial love for each other. Our love for each other is rooted in the love Jesus showed us in His death and resurrection.



It is this love which enabled Paul to write to the church in Ephesus saying that Christians were to bear "with one another in love" (Ephesians 4:2). And what does that love look like? It is a love that forgives even when others won't. It is a love that continues to love even when no sense of love may be expressed back. It is a love that endures on the hardest of days. It is a love that persists when all other loves fail. A Christian's love lasts for decades after romantic love has withered away. A Christian's love is rooted in the love Christ has shown us, and that love truly is eternal.



## Common Ground and a Way Forward

We rejoice to receive *every* life as a gift and a privilege. This includes those confused about the sanctity of life. Their ideas and positions contradict the Word of the Lord and His will. To be sure, "We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ" (2 Cor. 10:5). However, "we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against...spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places" (Eph. 6:12). So no matter how offensive we find a neighbor, we do not regard her or him as enemy, adversary, or opponent. God has created, redeemed, and called each one as His own precious treasure, the same as us. We want to rejoice with them as brothers and sisters unto eternity in all the blessings our Savior Jesus has obtained for us.

We do not need to prove them wrong or shut them up. The Eighth Commandment ("You

shall not give false testimony against your neighbor") invites us to presume the best of them. It means we expect they do not know about the sanctity of every human life rather than that they do not care. If they come across defensive or aggressive, we interpret it as woundedness and not cruelty. We remain humbly aware of our own sinfulness and limitations. Our witness to them proceeds "with gentleness and respect," offering "an explanation of the reason for the



hope that is in you" (2 Peter 3:15). Our For-Life conversations and interactions avoid snark and sarcasm. Why beat into submission when we may winsomely persuade? We patiently cultivate relationship with dialogue rather than dispute, and we honor the sacred space they've shared with us through genuine questions and considerate listening.

Objection: "The Bible doesn't address abortion or physician-assisted suicide."

Common Ground: "I totally agree with you that misinterpreting the Scriptures brings great harm."

Way Forward: "What do you believe the Bible does say about the worth of a person? May we investigate together?"

**Objection:** "Embryos only amount to something subhuman like tissue, tumors, or parasites." **Common Ground:** "You've insightfully identified the most important matter about abortion—whether we classify the embryo as a living human being."

Way Forward: "Perhaps scientific observations can give us some objective information about this."

Objection: "Abortion poses less threat to a woman's life than childbirth."

Common Ground: "Thank you for your sincere concern about women's welfare in our community." Way Forward: "Can we look together into the studies and statistics about the risks to women?"

Objection: "My body, my choice."

Common Ground: "I share your support for respecting the human body as precious."

Way Forward: "Can we consider the ways in which abortion might hurt human bodies and minds?"

Objection: "Abortions ensure equality, protect from poverty, and combat abandonment and abuse." Common Ground: "And we absolutely must work toward safe and fair communities for everyone." Way Forward: "Are we perhaps capable of better remedies for these problems?"

Objection: "Sexual assault survivors shouldn't have to carry the rapist's baby."

Common Ground: "We definitely have to discourage and discipline sexual assault vigorously."

Way Forward: "What do the survivors say they need for healing? How can we best allocate resources to serve them?"

**Objection:** "Better an abortion or assisted suicide than lifelong disability or relentless suffering." **Common Ground:** "You're right that chronic disabilities and terminal diagnoses often come with great difficulties."

Way Forward: "Do you think persons with disabilities ever enjoy their lives? Do we have any less extreme or more effective measures than death for alleviating pain?"

Objection: "Pro-life people only care about babies before birth and ignore others in need."

Common Ground: "It's true that every human life deserves our attention and protection."

Way Forward: "Would you like to hear about ways the sanctity of life is motivating churches and charities to show even more compassion than state welfare programs?"

**Objection:** "Opposing homosexuality and gender fluidity supports bigotry and bullying." **Common Ground:** "No one should have to endure bigotry or bullying of any kind from anyone for any reason."

Way Forward: "Is it possible that someone might actually experience or express discomfort with these lifestyles because they result in or result from mistreatment?"

The youth will hold a waffle breakfast fundraiser on Sunday 2/27 at 9 am un the Fellowship Hall.



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

## **Telling the Good News about Jesus**

#### What is our great privilege as Christians?

Through faith, we become disciples of Jesus Christ and, as such, it is our privilege to tell the good news about Jesus. We share with others the message of the salvation that is ours. And who are the people with whom we are to share the faith? Well, they are certainly our family members: husbands, wives, children, grandchildren, parents and so forth. But it does not stop there. That is only the beginning. It reaches out from there to our friends, to our fellow congregation members, to the people with whom we work, to our neighbors, and to the strangers we meet in our daily lives. Yes, this means actually talking to others about Jesus Christ and His great salvation.

Our privilege as Christians is to identify and recognize opportunities to tell others the good news about Jesus. And then, having recognized and identified those opportunities, ours is the privilege and responsibility of actually doing it— telling the good news about Jesus.

#### Where does telling the good news begin?

It begins with our personal thankfulness for the salvation that is ours in Jesus Christ. Each of us daily sins much and because of that, if left to ourselves, we deserve nothing but God's wrath and eternal damnation. And so does everyone in the world who has not come into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ.

But thanks be to God, something miraculous happened in your life! So great is the Father's love for all humanity, that He sent His precious Son into this world, to obey God perfectly, and to suffer and die for your sins and the sins of the whole world. Because of Jesus Christ, each and every one of your sins has been washed away. You are cleansed, pardoned and given the peace that passes all human understanding.

Of all the blessings that God will ever give you in your life, without a doubt the greatest one of all is the forgiveness that is yours in Jesus Christ, and with that forgiveness, the promise that when you die you will spend all eternity with the Lord in heaven.

#### What do we do with the good news of Jesus?

God has not given us this great salvation merely for us to content ourselves with it, and to stick it away and treasure it privately. He has given us this great salvation and then called each one of us to a life of being His witnesses. He gave us this great salvation to rejoice in, to live in and to share—yes, to share with others! He wants us to bring many others into His church, where they too will receive the blessings of God's Word and Sacraments, where they too will be made part of God's people—one of His own dear children. And what is more, God has promised that as we do, He will bless. For this fact too, we have every reason to thank and to praise the Lord.

The first president of our church, Dr. C.F.W. Walther made this extremely important point:

"Another major duty of a Synod that wants to be and remain an Evangelical Lutheran Synod is that it not seek its own glory, but only the glory of God, being intent not so much on its own growth, but rather on the growth of Christ's kingdom and the salvation of souls. You see, dear brethren, we are assembled here not for our own sake. We are in the faith, and by this faith we hope to be saved! But there are still many millions who have no faith! This is why we are here—so that we might bring salvation to as many people as we possibly can, so that the sad situation in Christendom and the corruption of the poor, blind heathen might be remedied. Only for this reason does our gracious God allow Christians to live on earth, that they might bring others to the saving faith. Otherwise God would immediately take a Christian to heaven as soon as he is converted."

#### Isn't evangelism just the pastor's job?

Evangelism is one of the pastor's important duties, but evangelism is not only the pastor's responsibility. Every Christian, through Baptism, is given the privilege of declaring the praises of Him who called us out of darkness into His marvelous light (1 Peter 2:9). Whenever we speak the Gospel, it is an actual communication of the forgiveness of sins. Telling the good news about Jesus to another person is not merely a casual conversation, nor is it merely expressing pious wishes. When we share with others the good news of Jesus, we are actually conveying to them the forgiveness of sins, for that is what the Gospel is all about. When the Gospel is

presented, God the Holy Spirit is present to work faith in the hearts of those who hear it.

Pastors and laypeople work together in the great task of making disciples of all nations, as together they tell the good news of Jesus. Together they work to make their congregations places where visitors feel welcome and places that have as a priority reaching out boldly with the Gospel. Hand in hand, pastors and congregations tell the good news about Jesus!

#### What is the starting place for telling the good news?

It begins with our love for others. Love always takes an interest in the good of our neighbor, our friend, our family member, without trying to figure out what we will receive in return. God's love is poured out into our hearts and overflows into the lives of others. God doesn't need our good works, but our neighbors, our friends, and our family members certainly do. Once we recognize how great is our own personal salvation and the enormous love of the Father's heart in saving us, we recognize that this love can remove barriers that stand in the way of our outreach to others. Barriers include apathy on our part and antagonism on the part of those with whom we speak. When we tell the good news of Jesus, following up that witness with love and kindness, there is something here that makes people pause and consider just what it is that makes Christians unique. It can lead people to ask, "What do you have? I need it."

How do we respond to our neighbor's question? We answer by telling the good news about Jesus. We explain that because of sin we are separated from God, but God loves us so much that He sent a Savior into this world to bring us back to Himself. The Bible says, "Always be ready to answer anyone who asks you to explain the hope you have, but be gentle and respectful" (1 Peter 3:15). Telling the saving Gospel is the greatest service any Christian can perform for a neighbor, or family member, or even the most casual stranger.

#### Isn't it rude for me to impose my beliefs on another?

Telling the good news about Jesus is certainly not rude, though the way we go about it might be. That we must avoid. The best way to tell the good news about Jesus is to do so gently and kindly. Telling the good news about Jesus is not "imposing our beliefs on another person." We need to shake ourselves free from the myth of our day that all beliefs are equally true, and one is no

better than the other. We do respect the beliefs of others, but we can't give them "equal time" when it comes to the question of where that person is going to spend all eternity.

Telling the good news of Jesus is more than merely "sharing my opinions." It is actually giving another person the Word of Life—the powerful, faith-creating Word of God by which God brings that person into His kingdom. So, telling the good news of Jesus is not rude, it is the most wonderful gift you could give to another human being.

# What can be done to prepare ourselves to tell others about Jesus?

To witness about Jesus we need to be in the Word and Sacraments often. In so doing, we are kept by the Lord in constant contact with the power and strength for witnessing, our Lord Jesus Himself. Receiving forgiveness and peace, we then are able to share it with others.

Turning to the Lord in prayer is the next thing we do when we wish to tell the good news about Jesus. Just imagine how much better we will be able to recognize opportunities to tell the good news about Jesus when we ask our heavenly Father to show them to us and then pray for the courage to speak. When we ask for open doors to tell the good news, we will be amazed to notice how doors are open and just waiting for us to walk through, telling the good news about Jesus!
