
Pastor's Corner

"It is truly meet, right, and salutary <u>that we should at all times and in all places give</u>

<u>thanks to You</u>, holy Lord, almighty Father, everlasting God, through Jesus Christ,
our Lord ..." (Communion Preface, Divine Service III)

As we sing the liturgy, some of the words we say strike me every week. The above underlined section is one of those portions. Just before communion, we announce to God the Father that "we should at all times and in all places give thanks to You." Just consider that for a moment. At "all times and in all places" we are to give thanks to God. Really? How can we do that? When we are struggling with our own sinful flesh (yet again) and despise the sinful nature we were born with, is that really a time to give thanks to God? When we are sitting in a hospital room, holding the hand of a loved one in their bed, not sure what tomorrow will bring, how easy is it to give thanks to God "at all times"? Or, when we are at a funeral viewing of someone we deeply miss and the heartache actually physically hurts, are we supposed to give thanks to God in "all places" - even in a funeral home? How are we able to do this?

In our worship we are indeed called to give thanks to God "at all times and in all places" and . . . we can! Remember WHEN we say this portion of a prayer – we say it right before the Lord's Supper. We say it moments before we remember Christ's death on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins. Moments before Christ lays His life-giving body into our hands to reassure us that He has conquered death itself for us. If



Christ can do all of this for us, how can we not give thanks to Him at all times and in all places!

We Christians are special. We don't need "good days" in order to give thanks to God. We don't need to be in "good places" to call out in faith to God. In fact, Christ loves it most when we call out to Him in thanksgiving during the very worst times in our lives. When we wrestle with our sinful nature, we can give thanks to God at that time that His cross has crucified our sinful nature and put it to death (Galatians 6:14). When we are at a hospital bed holding a hand of a loved one not knowing what tomorrow will look like, we can, even at that time, give thanks to God that we do know what our tomorrows look like through Christ. And even when we are at a funeral home staring at a loved one who is no longer moving, even at that "time and place" we can give thanks to God that our Lord Jesus Christ rose from the dead to promise us the gift of life everlasting. We truly can give thanks to God "at all times and in all places" because His death and resurrection reaches us at all times, and in all places, of our lives.

The Gospel of Jesus Christ draws us outside ourselves.

Jean-Paul Sartre had fifteen minutes of fame in the twentieth century. Many during the beatnik and boomer generations knew about this existentialist philosopher and author. Now only university students and their instructors recognize his name. He did once very relatably complain, "Hell is other people." Relatable, but wrong.

Hell is self: self above others and self alone. Sin drives us inward. Dr. Martin Luther—echoing St. Augustine of more than a thousand years earlier—described sin as *cor incurvatus in se.* This Latin phrase means "the heart curved in on oneself." Sinfulness disconnects us from our Almighty Maker and Heavenly Father. It divides us from one another. And it distorts our experiences, our emotions, our desires, and our identity.



God doesn't do lonely. Father, Son, and Holy Spirit personifies community in Himself. Humankind has a love-God. He has designed us for receiving and giving and sharing. His favor, grace, and forgiveness incorporate us into enchanting orbit with Him and with each other. Family and marriage, sexuality and procreation, humility and servanthood, these life issues orient us toward somebody besides me. What a fantastic freedom the gifts of God and the needs of my neighbors affords! Even discomforts and diseases become occasions and impulses for reaching out.

The Gospel deals in abundance. Life is always plural. It consistently resists isolation and evermore implies relationship. Jesus has come not only to bring us to God but also to bring us together. Every human life meets us as gift and privilege, created and redeemed and called by our Lord as His own precious treasure from fertilization to forever. And our life-affirming witness and service is surrounded and celebrated by a magnificent multitude of like-minded saints gone before, yet to come, and the world over.

So, we speak God's truth and show Christ's love, because heaven is other people!





2022 Stephen W. Johnson Mission Award Finalists Celebrated

In June, Concordia Lutheran Ministries announced the inaugural recipient of the organization's highest employee honor, the Stephen W. Johnson Mission Award, at a banquet and ceremony held in celebration of the award's 31 finalists.

The award was created by an employee-led committee to honor Concordia's late Chairman of the Board, Stephen W. Johnson, who served Concordia for 19 years and was a Zion member before passing away in 2020. He was a visionary of great faith and wisdom who guided Concordia in keeping its mission the top priority. The award preserves his memory and promotes recognition of employees' Christ-like hearts.

From Concordia's total 3,100 employees (in PA, OH and FL), 109 total nominees received a collective 177 nominations from community members, patients, residents and colleagues. A selection panel for the award blindly judged the nominations, ending with 31 finalists, including three honorable mentions and one recipient: **Shennel Crissman, a Licensed Practical Nurse at the Cabot Lund Care Center.**

Shennel's attention to detail and focus on her residents' every need made an impression on those who nominated her. On top of providing excellent medical care, she has cut residents' hair, picked up and served a resident couple their 70th anniversary dinner from their favorite restaurant, checked on her residents when they moved to a higher level of care or the hospital, stayed with residents when they were close to passing and attended the funerals of those she has cared for over the years, at last count having given her condolences in person to close to 90 families.

"Concordia has gone above and beyond for myself and family many times over my 19 -year career and have proved their mission," Shennel said. "As long as I'm willing and able, I will continue to go above and beyond to make my residents' stay at Concordia a comfortable, enjoyable and memorable experience. I will always put my faith in caring for my residents."

What About...



The Bible

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Bible continues to be the best selling book of all time. Throughout the ages, the Bible has provided inspiration, comfort and guidance to those who have read it. But is the Bible merely an inspirational book? It is this, but so much more! Let's spend a few moments reviewing some important truths.

What is the Bible?

The word "Bible" is from a Greek word meaning "book." What is this "good book"? That question has a two-part answer.

First, the Bible is actually a collection of books–66 of them to be exact–from the first book, Genesis, to the last, Revelation. These books cover thousands of years and were written in either Hebrew, Aramaic or Greek. There are many different kinds of writing in the Bible: historical narrative, prophecy, poetry, speeches, letters and so on. From a merely human perspective, there is no question that the Bible is a masterpiece of literature.

Second, the much more important answer to the question, "What is the Bible?" is this: The Bible is the Word of God. The Bible is the collection of the thoughts—even the very words—that God gave to the authors of the Biblical books. It is not a collection of ancient fables and myths. The Bible is the sure and certain means that God the Holy Spirit uses to communicate God's Word to us today.

How did we receive the Bible?

The Bible itself explains how we received it. "All Scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (2 Tim. 3:16). We read



elsewhere that, "Prophecy never had its origin in the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit" (2 Peter 1:21). Because people knew that the Bible was the actual Word of God, it was copied and re-copied with painstaking care and attention to detail, letter by letter, word by word. Though today we no longer possess the actual, original text of the Bible, we can be certain that the Holy Spirit has preserved the Word of God for us. Careful study of the many thousands of copies of the New Testament reveals that though there are minor differences between the various copies, there is no place

where any key teaching of the Bible is contradicted. Our English Bibles are translations from the original languages. When we use reliable translations, we can be sure that we have the true Word of God. Whatever the Word of God is in Hebrew, Aramaic or Greek, it is also the Word of God in English, or in any other language, as long as the translation is faithful to the original languages. Reliable translations include the King James Version, the New King James Version, the old Revised Standard Version, the New International Version and the English Standard Version.

Why is the Bible so important?

Someone may say, "The Bible is important to me because it tells me what to do" and another person might say, "The old stories remind me of my childhood" or "The Bible is a guidebook for daily living." These answers all have a grain of truth, but they miss the real reason why the Bible is so important: It is the sure and certain source for knowing who Jesus Christ is and what He has done for us.

Jesus said, "The Scriptures testify about me" (John 5:39). The main message of the Bible is the good news of God's work to reconcile the world to Himself through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Throughout Old and New Testaments, the central message of the Scripture is the account of how God was in the world preparing it to receive His Son and then what His Son did when He was here. It also tells how the church received this glorious message of salvation, and how it grew and spread throughout the known world. Luther once compared the Bible to the swaddling clothes the baby Jesus was wrapped in. Thus the Bible is Christ-centered.

Our Lord Jesus said, "If you remain in my Word, truly you are my disciples" (John 8:31). The divine authority and reliability of the Bible does not rest on the persons God used to write the Bible, nor on the endorsement of the Bible by the church, but rests entirely on the fact that it is the Word of the Lord. How do we know this? This confession of the Bible's complete authority is part of the certainty of the

faith God gives to us as a gift. Real human beings were given real words from God to write down. As our Lord Jesus Christ was both true God and true man, so the Bible is truly the Word of God and also the writing of human beings. Even as our Lord Jesus took on human flesh free from sin and error, so God used human beings to provide a written revelation of Himself that is free from error. Thus, we believe that the Bible is both incapable of error (infallible) and free from error (inerrant). There is a very important distinction one needs to keep in mind in order to understand the Bible correctly: the difference between Law and Gospel. The Bible reveals God's perfect holiness and righteousness, and His expectation of perfection. His Law, summarized best in the Ten Commandments, reveals our sinful rebellion and our inability to save ourselves. The Gospel is the joyful news that our Lord Jesus Christ has given us complete forgiveness from our sins through His life, death and resurrection for us. The proper distinction between Law and Gospel is the key to understanding the Bible correctly.

The most important message of the Bible is not the Law of God. The Bible is not merely a collection of principles for daily living. The Bible is not a textbook that answers every possible question we may have. Nor for that matter is the Bible a book that predicts every last detail about the future. The central and most important teaching in the Bible is the Gospel, the good news of God's gift of salvation through Jesus Christ. The Gospel is the message that predominates throughout the Bible, from Old Testament to New Testament. Thus the Bible is Gospel-centered.

How Do We Use the Bible?

The Bible is foundational for the church's ministry. The Bible was never intended to stand alone or apart from the community of faith we call the Christian church. It is sad when some people think that, if they just read the Bible, they can stay away from church. We receive our Lord's gifts with joy and do not say, "We want this, but not that." It would be misleading if our high respect for the Scriptures was used to drive a wedge between the Bible and the church. The church is the gathering of God's people around the Lord's Word and Sacraments.

We Lutherans realize that Scripture must be interpreted according to the central truth of the Bible, the Gospel, not picked apart and made to teach things that actually conflict with the Gospel. Therefore, we pay close attention to the grammar and words of the Bible, seeking out the intended meaning, which is the plain sense of the text. We recognize that God the Holy Spirit works through the Scriptures to create and sustain the church as it comes together around the preaching of the Word and the administration of the Sacraments.

Whenever the Word of God is preached, taught, studied, read, learned or meditated on, the Holy Spirit is actively turning people from their sin and drawing

them to Christ for their salvation. Thus, we will want to be in the Word daily. At home we read and meditate on the Word through our private and family devotions. At



church, our hymns and liturgy are anchored in the Word of God. Our pastors preach to us on the basis of the Scripture lessons appointed for each Sunday in the church year. Our school teachers lead our children into a deeper knowledge of the Word of God. In Sunday school, children learn the biblical accounts and thus have a foundation for their lives. In youth and adult Bible studies, the Scriptures are studied in a variety of ways so they can inform and enlighten us and help us understand how we live out our lives as God's people.


What a blessed gift the Holy Scriptures are to us and to all people! Everything God wants us to know about Himself is contained in His Word. Through the Scriptures, the Holy Spirit reveals the truth about our sinful condition and the joyful news of God's saving work for us through His Son, Jesus Christ. Truly, God's Word is a lamp to our feet and a light for our path (Ps.119:105). For that reason we pray, "Lord, keep us steadfast in your Word."


