Pastor's Corner

The Bible: The Best A.I. Ever!

You then, my child, be strengthened by the grace that is in Christ Jesus, and what you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses entrust to faithful men, who will be able to teach others also. - 2 Tim. 2:1-2

Have you heard about "artificial Intelligence" in the news lately (often referred to as A.I.)? There has been a great deal of discussion about the positive things A.I. could do (in medicine, literature, graphics, etc). There are others who have voiced major concerns A.I. could be abused in devastating ways (in warfare, creation & dissemination of falsehoods, creating of graphics so real they could "fake" what a person says). As with everything sinful man creates, A.I. could be used in positive ways. But as with everything sinful man creates, you can also be sure A.I. will be abused.

Perhaps the greatest concern with A.I. is that it might corrupt our interactions with one another and could even corrupt what we think, how we act, and what we believe. I'm not worried though. I truly am not. I <u>am</u> worried for the unbelieving world around us. I have no doubt A.I. will help the world spiral further into self-possessed ways as it always has. However, I am <u>not</u> necessarily worried about the church. I say that because thanks to God and all Christ does for us every day, we are already being steered in what we do, in how we act, and in what we believe. God is the one who already steers us every day by the Holy Spirit and the Scriptures.

In fact, I think we could view God as truly the GREATEST "A.I." ever. What is so wonderful is that God's Word doesn't lie to us, His Word tells us the truth. God's Word doesn't corrupt us, His Word refreshes us in such wonderful ways. God's Word doesn't seek to destroy us, but by believing in God, He blesses us with the gift of everlasting life (John 5:24).



Believe me, I'm not naïve regarding the challenges A.I. may bring to our lives. As Christians though, we <u>already</u> have the greatest guide we will ever need who molds our lives every day, our Lord Jesus Christ.



The only challenge A.I. may bring to Christians is that we in the church could cease being guided by the Scriptures. This has always been a danger to the church on earth and it always will be. For us Christians, we need to ensure we are always being guided by God's Word and God's Word <u>alone</u>. And this means everybody in the church should be guided by God's Word; our church leadership, our pastors, our elders, our Sunday school teachers, our parents, our youth, and our children.

God is always speaking to you. He never leaves you alone, and He never will. May all of us allow the Holy Spirit to shape our minds and hearts. May God's Word mold us more and more every day into the image of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

I hope you are all looking forward to coming to the Quarterly Regular Voters' Meeting on July 30th, after the second service to enjoy a light luncheon and hear the reports from the Pastor, Council Officers, Boards and Committees that serve you and the ministries at your church.

This Body of Christ has found favor with the Lord for 125 years and I hope you all are planning on celebrating our anniversary in September. Please be alert for the various communications with regard to our 125th Celebration. Don't let it pass you by. Enjoy being a

Zion Lutheron Church 125 years in God's grace chosen Christian and celebrate the gift of this parish that God has given you. The vision of the originators of this church lives on in YOU and hopefully many others to follow.

There will be some large projects happening at Zion in the coming weeks before September. We're undergoing a large landscaping renovation to make the property more manageable and attractive. The

narthex carpeting will be replaced with tile. Additional windows in the sanctuary will be replaced with more energy efficient double pane products. Some security issues will be addressed; hopefully before the school year begins. The old kitchen doors will be replaced. Your trustees have been quite busy these last few years.

Consider helping out on a board or committee! The nominating committee and process will begin in August/Sept and new positions will be filled at the October Voters' Meeting. We'll announce the opportunities/positions that will need to be filled. 
Hopefully, during the next 6 to 9 months we will enact an Endowment at Zion to provide for a more perpetual form of financial growth and monetary support. We're very blessed right now and we need to think ahead and structure our financial position smartly. Attend the Voters' Meetings to stay informed on the progress of these types of matters and to participate in your church's business plan. Be a cheerful giver and support your church.

Over the last 30+ years, Zion has accomplished a lot and endured a lot; both good and sometimes not so good. But, we've persevered and by the Grace of Almighty God we've

grown to where and what we are today. It might be a good time to consider the future vision for Zion and take the pulse of the membership in some respects with regard to a future "vision" for our ministries. We are possibly at an "inflection point" of sorts and over the

coming months it might be an idea to take stock of ourselves and discuss the ministries and our potential to grow our church in a manner that is responsible and also advantageous to the fulfillment of the Great Commission and our stated purpose in Article II of our Constitution, "<u>To</u> equip, send and support the members of the congregation to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ." So, stay tuned to participate in any efforts to survey or procure your opinions on matters pertaining to growth at Zion.

Christianity started with some apostles and less than one hundred followers who went out to speak the truth to a world that was hostile,



yet in places hungry enough for the Holy Spirit to seed in the hearts and minds of some people. We're part of an ongoing process of continuing that work started so long ago. It requires more of us than merely attending church services; though surely that is a requirement of our dedication to our Lord. Five and a half years ago I asked you -- whether you were a "member" or "just belonged" to your church? A member (like your hand and feet are members of your body) actively participates and is engaged in the organization; while something or someone who merely belongs to it, is more like your shoes or your coat -- it merely belongs to you and really isn't an integral part of your being.

Opportunity is a fleeting thing. We're only here for a blink of an eye when you look at the time that has passed since the crucifixion. What should we -- you -- do to make our church a bastion of Christian love and refuge from an ever-increasing world of turmoil and confusion? Together we can do wonders.

We cannot look at our called work to spread the Gospel as some minor, or insurmountable, task! Remember the closing words of Paul in the book of Acts as he declares, (after admonishing the Jews for their "dull hearts")

"Therefore, let it be known to you that this salvation of God has been sent to the Gentiles; they will listen."

Evangelism calls; let's all pitch in and make our church a beacon of hope to the ears that will hear. Let's grow the Kingdom at Zion! No dull hearts here!!!



The Convention will take place July 29th – August 3rd in Milwaukee. Delegates will elect officers, debate and vote on resolutions, gather for worship, study God's Word and more. Susie Bishop will attend the Convention as one of the voting delegates for the Eastern District.

The theme chosen for the convention is "We Preach Christ Crucified," from 1 Corinthians 1. This central message will inform delegates as they discuss vital matters related to the Concordia University System, church fellowship, providing pastors for LCMS congregations and other matters necessary to the operation of the church.

The June/July issue of *The Lutheran Witness* is a preview of what's coming up in convention. It includes biographical summaries, personal statements and Q&As with the five presidential nominees. It also introduces the convention essayists and provides a short summary of their presentations. In the "Overture Overview," readers will find a quick outline of the major matters that delegates will face on the convention floor.

Most important, though, readers will be reminded – as they always are in the pages of LW – of Christ and Him crucified for the sins of the world. As the Rev. Roy



Askins, *LW* managing editor, writes in his column, "For Christ has not built His church on the shifting sands of popular opinion or worldly wisdom, but upon the preaching of Christ crucified – a message of folly to many, but of salvation to us who are called."


In Memoriam

Specialized Spiritual Care Brings Christ's Message to All

"We know we can count on You each and every day," prayed the Rev. Roger Nuerge, pastor at Concordia of Cranberry, a care community in Mars, Pa., as he visited with 105-year-old Paul Coleman on June 1. Concordia of Cranberry is part of Concordia Lutheran Ministries (CLM), and LCMS Recognized Service Organization (RSO) based in Cabot, Pa., about an hour northeast of Pittsburgh.

"We're going to count on You tomorrow too," continued Nuerge. "You promise never to leave us or forsake us. You promise that there is forgiveness in Your shed blood for all of us, and You promise a life that's everlasting through the power of the resurrection of You Son, Jesus. So hear our prayer for Paul today and every day as we commend him -- body, soul and spirit -- into your hands."



Nuerge is part of a team of pastors and deaconesses at CLM that provide daily chaplaincy care to the residents through visitation, Bible study and worship. With

28 member congregations, CLM is one of the largest nonprofit senior care providers in the country, serving around 50,000 people per year, and part of the larger church that cares for God's people across the Synod as an extension of its workers and congregations.

Nuerge's work often includes caring for those who may not have people in their lives to check on them or who have been overlooked or seemingly forgotten. On this day, he reminded Coleman, a beloved child of God, that he is not forgotten by Christ.

"What does spiritual care look like? It just means [showing] interest in people and who they are -- just the way they are ... as helpless as they are ... as sinful as they are. They're still important to God, and they are important to us too. That's what spiritual care looks like."



What About... Holy Baptism

Suppose for a moment that there was a doctor who had such incredible talent that he could prevent people from dying, and bring those who had died back to life, never to die again. Just imagine how people would do whatever they could to be treated by this doctor! Now consider that in Holy Baptism, God actually does give us the gift of eternal life!

What is Baptism? Baptism is not just plain water,



but it is the water included in God's command and combined with God's Word.¹

What's so special about a handful of simple water? Nothing, until God connects His Word to it! In Baptism, that is exactly what God is doing. He combines His life-creating and lifegiving Word with the waters of Holy

Baptism, and thereby we are born again of water and the Spirit (John 3:5).

What is that Word of God? Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Matthew: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matt.28:19).

Our Lord commands Baptism. It is not optional, nor is it simply a nice "extra." God's Word takes on many forms, according to His good and gracious will. The Word is preached, taught, and proclaimed. It is read, studied and meditated on. And it is that Word of God, His promise, that makes Baptism what it is. God Himself is present as His name is joined to the water, with all His power and all His blessings of forgiveness, life and salvation. Christ consecrates the water of Baptism with His Word, so as we in Baptism stand with Christ in the water, the Father calls us His beloved children, the Holy Spirit is given to us, and heaven is opened to us. Those who receive Baptism after they have been brought to faith by the preaching or teaching of the Word also receive all the blessings God has attached to Baptism.

What benefits does Baptism give? It works forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this, as the words and promises of God declare. Which are these words and promises of God? Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Mark: "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned" (Mark 16:16).

In and through Baptism, God cleanses us from all our sins, snatches us from the power of Satan, and gives us everlasting life. It is all God's doing. It is His promise. In Baptism, our Triune God imparts to each of us personally the gifts the Lord Jesus Christ won for the world through His life, suffering, death, and resurrection. See Gal.3:27; Col.1:13–14; 1 Peter 3:21; Titus 3:5–7 and 1 Cor.6:11.

How can water do such great things? Certainly not just water, but the word of God in and with the water does these things, along with the faith which trusts this word of God in the water. For without God's Word the water is plain water and no Baptism. But with the word of God it is a Baptism, that is, a life-giving water, rich in grace, and a washing of the new birth in the Holy Spirit, as St. Paul says in Titus, chapter three: "He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal in the Holy Spirit, whom He poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by His grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life. This is a trustworthy saying" (Titus 3:5–8).

Of course, simple water can't do such great things, but the water of Baptism is not simple water! Baptism is one very special way God delivers to us the blessings Christ won for us. Baptism is not something we do, but something God does. Therefore, it is far more than a symbol. It is a sacred act in which God Himself is at work

forgiving sins, giving new life in Christ and bestowing on us the Holy Spirit with all of His gifts. Baptism gives us the faith through which we receive these gifts. God the Holy Spirit works faith in the promises attached to Baptism.

What does such baptizing with water indicate? It indicates that the Old Adam in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, and that a new man should daily emerge and arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

Where is this written? St. Paul writes in Romans chapter six: "We were therefore buried with Him through Baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life" (Rom.6:4).

In Baptism we are buried with Christ, and in Baptism we are raised with Christ. His death and resurrection are made our own, and because of that fact, through our entire life, we are able to say, "I am baptized!" Having been buried with Christ into His death we do not have to be afraid of the tomb in which we will rest one day. Christ has already been there. In Holy Baptism we have passed through His grave into His resurrection.

What does Baptism have to do with our daily life?

Everything! Our entire life is a life lived trusting in the promises of God, given to us in and through Holy Baptism. We are constantly returning to Baptism. In moments of temptation and suffering in our lives, when all seems to be crashing down on us, and in particular in those moments when our sin and the guilt of those sins haunt us, we are able, as Luther says, to "Pull out our Baptism and wave it under the devil's nose and say, 'I am baptized ... I have God's bath. It is Christ's own blood.' It is a bath blessed and mixed with the blood of Christ."² We can't return to the cross of Christ, nor should we attempt to imagine ourselves back there. No, we turn instead to the "here and now" reality of God's work in our lives. We return to our Baptism. For it was there and then that God buried us with Christ and raised us with Him .

Why are infants and young children baptized?

They are baptized for the same reason adults are baptized — because of the command and promise of God. What is promised in Baptism is given to all who receive it; therefore, infants and young children also

have the promise of God. They, too, are made children of God. Jesus specifically invites little children to come to Him (Luke 18:15–17). But most important, as sinners, infants need what Baptism gives.



By His word, God created all that is

seen and unseen. By His word, our Lord Christ called a dead man from the tomb (John 11:43–44). The unborn child, John the Baptist, leaped in his mother's womb when he heard the word of God (Luke 1:41–44). Why is there any doubt that in and through the Word and the promise of Baptism, God works a similar gift of faith in the infant? If we misunderstand Baptism to be our work, then we will always cast doubt on it. When we recognize that it is not our work, but God's gracious promise and work, we realize that infants are to be baptized and receive the treasures offered in and through Baptism. Sadly, there are individuals and church bodies that deny Baptism to young children and infants. They do not believe that these little ones need what Holy Baptism gives. They do not believe what the Bible teaches so clearly, namely, that God saves us through Baptism. As a result of these false teachings, they deny both to themselves and to others the power, blessing and comfort of Holy Baptism. That is tragic, for it is a most serious offense against God to deny what He plainly declares in His Word: "The promise is for you and your children" (Acts 2:39) and "Baptism now saves you" (1 Peter 3:21).


