Pastor's Corner

Our Refuge & Strength

". . . Together as His people let us take refuge in the infinite mercy of God, our heavenly Father, seeking His grace for the sake of Christ, and saying: God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

Confession and Absolution, Divine Service IV

The recent war between Hamas and Israel was a shocking surprise for many. As the invasion passed and the stories of Israelites were told, horrible details came to light of how Hamas treated them. One thing I found particularly shocking is that the Israelis would hide in shelters which are designed to be a refuge for them from rocket and mortar attacks which, sadly, are frequent. Many Israelites ran to these shelters seeking refuge from the invasion. But Hamas knew this. In some cases, Hamas would set these bomb shelters on fire, other times fighters would toss grenades inside, in other cases they would indiscriminately shoot the people seeking refuge inside these bomb shelters. These concrete refuges supposed to be "safe spaces," ended up being a concrete tomb for the people inside.

When life or death comes at us, we seek shelter, a place of refuge where we will be safe. But it doesn't matter sometimes, does it? Sometimes it seems like no matter what we do, there is no safe refuge that we can build with our human hands. Bomb shelters in Israel failed to keep the

people safe. Even less dramatic refuges we seek can also fail. If you are caught in a sudden downpour of rain outside only to seek refuge under an awning, the awning might have holes that still let the water drip on you. If a blizzard suddenly hits, people could take refuge in a house seeking comfort, only to find the house has no electricity. No electricity means no heat. We can seek all kinds of refuges in this world from all kinds of threats. But for us Christians only one refuge is eternal, and always standing; the refuge we find in the forgiveness of our sins.



When the weight of our sin weighs us down, when the devil himself attacks us with guilt, or when our sinful nature is pestering us yet again, where do we go for refuge? Concrete bunkers? Awnings? Warm houses? Of course not! We go to our Lord Jesus Christ and in Him alone we, "take refuge in the infinite mercy of God, our heavenly Father, seeking His grace for the sake of Christ." And there in Christ, we are safe, we truly are safe, and no one and no thing can touch us! During this month when our attention often turns to those things to be thankful for, I pray we are thankful every single day for the safe refuge we each have in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.



A New Path for the Jasephs



Greetings in the name of our risen Lord and Savior! Rachel and I hope and pray that you are well, even as we appreciate your prayers and support of our family. You may have also seen that we are expecting our first child in February.

We recently completed a year of life and service in Uruguay at the end of August, and yet we have even more news to share than the anxious expectation of our daughter. I recently received a call to serve back in the US,

at Martini Lutheran in Baltimore, MD. I have accepted this call. Please pray for the members of Martini and for the work of the Gospel in the congregations and outreach to Baltimore as Rachel and I are called to that new mission field.

One year of international deployment may not seem like much, but Rachel and I have been working within these calls, my first assignment out of seminary, since June of 2021. This year in June, I also remembered 10 years of a career in ministry that began when I served as the LCMS's first regional communication specialist in Africa. Through that lay position, I met Rachel, who had done her diaconal internship in Peru and served her first call in the Dominican Republic. The Office of International Mission (OIM) has played a large role in the

beginning of our careers and was responsible in no small way for our having met. Since then, I have worked in parishes, schools, and studied at seminary. Rachel and I have learned and grown so much from our time as single, and now married, missionaries.

Immediately after studies at seminary and ordination in 2021, I had the opportunity to assist some of the many congregations in vacancy in the immediate area around my parents' home in Maryland. I was struck as a young and new pastor at the great needs, hunger, and desire for the Word



of God that I found at these vacant congregations, and the needs of those many others across the United States. This was still in the midst of the Covid pandemic, during and after which many pastors died or retired. I was struck by the Good Shepherd's promise to send undershepherds to His hurting and scattered flock since 2020, when my own vicarage work was impacted by the shutdowns. For this reason, I began writing pastoral letters and sharing devotions. This desire to care for God's people has been present in my heart and actions for the last 10 years, and I have been afforded a new opportunity and perspective to share Christ's love and mercy as an ordained pastor.

I have been able to practice and share the same during our last two years of preparation and deployment in the US, the Dominican Republic, and in Uruguay. I learned Spanish quickly and

began writing, teaching, preaching, and providing spiritual care in short order, thanks be to God. It is a skill I hope to keep sharp for the rest of my life. The Lord has shown a new path to Rachel and I that we did not expect, and has seen fit to usher in a new season of life for our family. During this time we have been able to lead the first cohort of deaconess students from Uruguay in the distance diaconal program through the seminary in the Dominican Republic. I have been able to lead bible studies, provide spiritual care, plan and conduct services, and encourage the flock of Christ in the life of His Church, all in Spanish. Rachel has



been able to spearhead the continuing education program for deaconesses trained through the seminary in the DR. These things are never in vain, no matter how short or long a worker is called to serve. Please keep Christians throughout Central & South America in your prayers, especially in Uruguay.

We encourage you and your congregation to prayerfully consider how you may be involved locally or overseas with the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in the mission of God, that the Good News of Jesus Christ would go out to all peoples and all corners of the world. There are many opportunities and many deployed missionaries around the world, and you can explore this

by speaking with the Mission Advancement team in OIM. However, there may even be opportunities in your own backyard to give a reason for the hope that is in you. Not everyone is sent overseas as a missionary, but every Christian who dies at the baptismal font and leaves it alive and forgiven never really leaves those lifegiving waters. You are sent out newly each day, as a beloved child of God, carrying the same hope and forgiveness you received from your Lord.

Rachel and I are so grateful for your support and prayers, whether you have journeyed with us for a few months, a few years, or many more. There is no way for us to adequately thank you, but we are grateful as you have followed our paths to ministry, marriage, and being parents. We are blessed beyond measure from our time living in Kenya, Peru, the Dominican Republic, and Uruquay, and from visiting the saints in so many states in the US.

One of my favorite Bible passages has long been Proverbs 16. "The plans of the heart belong to man, but the answer of the tongue is from the Lord...the heart of man plans his way, but the Lord establishes his steps." (Prov. 16:1, 9) My life is proof of this passage. A hymn that comes to mind encapsulates the uncertainty we experience in our lives, and also the courage and fearlessness that is ours in Christ. We have been set free, truly free, by Jesus' death and resurrection which He has freely given to us. What then can we not do? Where then can we not be sent, now knowing of this great family of Christ of which we are now a part? Knowing that nothing can harm us, for our life is hidden away with Christ, we are the hands, feet, mouth, and love of Christ, whom He uses to work His love and mercy in the world.

"Come, follow Me," the Savior spake, "All in My way abiding; Deny yourselves, the world forsake, Obey My call and guiding. O bear the cross, whate'er betide, Take my example for your guide..."

Then let us follow Christ, our Lord, And take the cross appointed And, firmly clinging to His Word, In suff'ring be undaunted. For those who bear the battle's strain The crown of heav'nly life obtain. (sts. 1, 5; LSB 688)

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




Life Thoughts in the Church Year ...

... are designed to help Christians see the church year through the lens of the sanctity of human life. Life Thoughts are based on the appointed readings from Lutheran Service Book using the Three-Year Lectionary.

November 5 – Pentecost XXIII (Proper 26A) – The Lord our God has given us sexuality for relationship, family, and community. These matters cannot become merely private choices or personal preferences. What we do with our bodies also affects our neighbors (1 Thessalonians 4:3-6). Abortion reveals that lust always leads to destruction. Marriage and parenting prove we do not need abortion – indeed, these gifts leave us no room for it!

November 12 – Pentecost XXIV (Proper 27A) – Like the parable's bridegroom, Jesus often meets us in unexpected moments (Matthew 25:10). He even sometimes hides in surprise pregnancies or terminal diagnoses in order to rescue and bless. So, we dare not ignore the poor and needy neighbors who cry out for deliverance (Psalm 70:1, 5) from abortion and assisted suicide. If we do indeed love the Lord's salvation, then let us say so (Psalm 70:4)!



November 19 – Pentecost XXV (Proper 28A) – Many around us despair because the world pressures them into the violence and fraud (Zephaniah 1:9) of viewing death as a solution to difficulty. In the sanctity of every human life, we have riches to spare (Matthew 25:15). Gospel hope and joy are not just for us to possess. Jesus brings us faith and life to proclaim and put into practice.

November 26 – Pentecost XXIV (Proper 29A) – Guilt and grief can devastate those who abort their own children (Matthew 25:37-38). The Lord God longs to relieve their wounds with His forgiveness (Ezekiel 34:16). If Jesus overcomes death for us, He can also subdue it for them (1 Corinthians 15:25-26). May our mouths make the joyful noise (Psalm 95:2) of explicitly applying His atoning grace to every sin!

What About...



What is the Difference Between the ELCA and the LCMS

August 1997 will be long remembered as an important time in the history of the Lutheran church here in America. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America [ELCA] made a number of very significant decisions during that month. It declared full communion with three Reformed churches: the United Church of Christ, the Reformed Church of America, and the Presbyterian Church—USA. It based this decision on its opinion that there is no longer essential disagreement between the ELCA and these Reformed churches. Furthermore, the ELCA decided that the long-standing differences between Lutheranism and Roman Catholicism over the question of how we are saved have been resolved.

These decisions have caused considerable confusion within the ELCA as well as within our own church, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod [LCMS]. It has caused many people to wonder what the differences are between the ELCA and the LCMS, even though our two churches both use the name "Lutheran."

The LCMS has a tremendous opportunity to make it very clear, both to our own members, as well as to the world at large, what it means to remain committed to the full truth of the Holy Scriptures and the historic confessions of the Lutheran church. This article is intended to offer a brief overview of the key differences between the ELCA and the LCMS, enabling you to understand them so that you will be able to discuss them with others.

Our Difference Over the Bible

The LCMS and the ELCA disagree about the nature and authority of the Bible. While both churches profess allegiance to the Reformation principle that Scripture alone is the supreme authority for the church's doctrine and life, there are significant differences when it comes to putting this principle into practice.

The LCMS believes that the Bible is actually the Word of God, and therefore, is totally truthful, reliable and free from any error. The Scriptures are the final standard by which we must judge everything that we believe, teach and confess.

The ELCA, on the other hand, avoids making statements that confess the full truthfulness of the Bible. It holds that Scripture is not always accurate or trustworthy in all its parts and details. It tolerates and encourages methods of interpreting Scripture that presuppose it contains error and is unclear about various doctrinal matters.

Our difference over the Bible explains other more visible differences. For example, the LCMS does not ordain women to the pastoral office, while the ELCA does, in spite of the fact that Scripture clearly teaches otherwise.

In addition, the LCMS unequivocally teaches that homosexual behavior is intrinsically sinful because it is contrary to God's Word. In love, we want to help the person caught up in the homosexual life to repent of his sin and receive God's forgiveness. The ELCA has been unable to take a clear Biblical stand against homosexual behavior. It also tolerates groups within its midst that openly advocate the homosexual lifestyle both for clergy and laity.

Similarly, the LCMS has repeatedly condemned willful abortion as contrary to God's clear commandment not to murder. The ELCA has not been able to speak out clearly against abortion, and, sadly, even pays for willful abortion procedures for members in its health insurance plan.

While there are other examples, these three illustrate that our differences over the authority and reliability of God's Word lie at the heart of other differences between the ELCA and LCMS.

The Authority of the Lutheran Confessions

Our two churches also disagree about the authority of the historic Lutheran confessional statements in the Book of Concord. The LCMS binds itself to the entire doctrinal content of the 16th-century Lutheran confessional writings. We agree with the confessions of our church not merely insofar as they agree with the Bible (a position which would allow individual members to reject certain doctrines), but because these confessional statements are in complete harmony with God's inspired and inerrant Word. We therefore accept without reservation all the confessions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church as a true and

unadulterated statement and exposition of the Word of God, normative also for the church today.

The ELCA, on the other hand, does not require that its church workers and congregations pledge unqualified acceptance of the full doctrinal content of the Book of Concord. The ELCA views the Lutheran Confessions as historical expressions of the faith held to be true at the time they were written, but not necessarily as standards for teaching and practice today.

What is Necessary for Church Fellowship

Given its approach to the Holy Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions, it is no surprise that the ELCA would consider it possible to enter into fellowship with churches that teach things that are clearly contrary to the Word of God and the Lutheran Confessions. These sorts of fellowship arrangements are a reflection of the attitude that absolute truth is unable to be known and confessed. This attitude is contrary to the confessional principle of the Lutheran church that is characterized in the Book of Concord with two very important phrases: "We believe, teach, and confess" and "We reject and condemn." These phrases reflect that Lutheran church's firm belief that God's Word does assert truth that is binding for all times and all peoples, and that we are able with joy to confess this truth.

The LCMS believes that the Bible requires full agreement in doctrine before it is possible to join in altar and pulpit fellowship with other churches (Rom. 16:17). On the other hand, the ELCA believes that disagreement in important doctrinal truths does not prohibit altar and pulpit fellowship with other churches.

A good example of this attitude is found in the documents the ELCA used to establish church fellowship with the three Reformed churches. In these documents, it is admitted that "important theological differences ... remain between our two churches in such questions as the understanding of the Lord's Supper and Christology." These differences are viewed "not as disagreements that need to be overcome, but as diverse witnesses to the one Gospel that we confess in common." What this means is that the ELCA is willing to tolerate the Reformed church's denial that Jesus

Christ is really present in the consecrated bread and wine of the Lord's Supper. The Reformed believe Jesus is present only "spiritually" but not really present in a miraculous manner in the bread and wine. Lutheranism has never accepted the Reformed Church's denial of our Lord's real presence in Holy Communion. The ELCA now claims that the errors of the Reformed Church regarding the Lord's Supper and the doctrine of the person and work of Christ are acceptable options. This has never before been the position of the Lutheran church, and reveals a decided movement away from historic Lutheranism on the part of the ELCA.

The ELCA's attitude toward doctrine obscures the vital relationship that exists between the saving Gospel of our Lord and all other teachings of Scripture that are rooted in that Gospel.

Synod's Opportunity for Faithful Clarity

All Lutherans have a wonderful opportunity to wrestle with the question of what it means to be a confessional Lutheran church in this day and age. What does it mean to say that we embrace the Holy Scripture as the inerrant and inspired Word of God? What teachings will therefore be rejected? What truths will be raised high as positions that can never be compromised or bargained away for the sake of external church unity? What does it mean to say we agree unconditionally with the Lutheran Confessions as pure expositions of the Word of God? Is "agreeing to disagree" an appropriate attitude for Lutherans when it comes to establishing church fellowship?

The differences between our two churches are a source of great sadness for the LCMS. We wish that our two churches could share a common confession of what it means to be Lutheran. It is important that the members of LCMS congregations have a clear picture of why our two church bodies are not in fellowship. Knowing the basic differences between our two churches will help us talk with our ELCA friends and family members in a loving manner.


