#### **Pastor's Corner**

#### "We rejoice in our sufferings"

2 Corinthians 5:3

Thanksgiving is coming. It is a time when we are supposed to give thanks. A lot of times we think of the concrete things: we give thanks for food, our clothes, our homes. These are all good things for which we give thanks to God. However, there is usually something we leave off our list of thanksgiving. The apostle Paul often speaks of being thankful for . . . our sufferings.

Let me be the first one to say how odd I initially think it is to say we should be "thankful" for suffering. Being thankful for pain, for emotional trauma, for disease, for persecutions we face as Christians, just seems to go against our very grain, doesn't it? Who on earth wants to suffer? I don't. I doubt you do either. We try to shy away from every form of suffering imaginable. But in doing so, we also miss out on something: becoming so broken that we rely upon Christ for everything.

Every single one of us will go through suffering in this life. It's a fact. We will. Suffering is guaranteed in this fallen world (Genesis 3). We will each face horrendous diseases as our bodies breakdown. We will face spiritual sufferings and temptations. Our minds may become fractured and broken with mental illness. Our children will also face struggles no child should ever go through. And yes, then there is death. Each of us will watch the ones we hold dearest die. One day, we ourselves will also go through death as well. None of us is immune to it.


In spite of all these things though, Paul still had the guts to say, "we rejoice in our sufferings." Was he mad? Some people might say so. I have another thought. Paul understood the secret of not just enduring suffering, but actually seeing it as a time God can turn into something good. Just as God turned the terribleness of the cross into the salvation of the entire world, the Apostle Paul was also able to see how God can "re-cycle" the terribleness of suffering we go through into something good, beneficial, and faith strengthening.

#### **Pastor's Corner**

In 2 Corinthians 12, Paul speaks about an illness he was called by God to endure. We don't know exactly what Paul was suffering, but it was bad enough that Paul asked God to take this illness away three times. God's answer to Paul's request was basically a "no" as God said, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Paul didn't cry about this, or moan that this was unfair. Paul's response was, "Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

"For when I am weak, then I am strong." Paul could say this because his strength did not rely upon Himself. Paul relied only upon the strength of Jesus Christ. It took a bit of a beating down for Paul to realize this. Suffering is serious business. Disease, death, sadness, heartache are not laughing matters to be ridiculed or taken lightly. They are serious. God is also equally serious in meeting all of you in those moments. Christ is there with Himself calling you to remember that indeed if anything "good" can be said to come from suffering, it is this: God is allowing you to become weak, so that He might become strong in you. Now, there is something we can truly be thankful for!



The Parable of the Pumpkin—October's Chapel Lesson

Every October we do the "Parable of the Pumpkin" chapel lesson, and my newsletter article is always on this lesson. It's not because I don't have anything else to write about, it's because this lesson never gets old, because it's the lesson that children (and adults) need to hear over and over, and it's what we are here to teach our 183 little children. Jesus is the Son of God, our one and only true Savior. The lesson is conveyed in a visual way using two carved pumpkins side by side. One pumpkin is cleaned out, smiling and lit from within. The other pumpkin is dark inside, still filled with seeds and pulp and frowning. Can you guess which pumpkin represents life with Jesus? Can you guess which pumpkin represents life without Jesus? I explain that the seeds and pulp (or slime as the children like to say) is like sin, and is why it's dark and sad. To the contrary, the other pumpkin has been washed and clean out, with it's light shining. It's like baptism and the washing away of our sins. At this point, I ask the children to look to the cross and remember that Jesus died for us because He loves us and forgives us from our sins. "God said "Let the light shine out of the darkness, made His light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ.


Abortions in the U.S. Hit Historic New Low – On September 18, the Guttmacher Institute reported a seven-percent drop in abortions across the U.S. to a new all-time low. Guttmucher records the numbers through a national census of abortion providers. According to the comprehensive abortion data, 862,320 abortions were reported in 2017, a decline from 926,200 in 2014, the report showed. The abortion rate also fell to 13.5 per 1,000 women of childbearing age—down from 14.6 in 2014 and 16.9 in 2011. According to the report, 32 states passed about 400 pro-life laws during the time period, including informed consent, parental consent, and waiting-period requirements. The annual number of legal abortions shows a continued downward trend since its peak in the 1980s, with a slight uptick between 2006 and 2008. The analysis suggests the decline is at the lowest level of abortion on record since the U.S. Supreme Court legalized the procedure in 1973. (CNA.com, Life-News.com, 9/18/19; CLR LifeWire, 9/19/19).

#### What Is a Bethesda Ambassador?

The Bethesda Ambassadors, working together with other Bethesda staff in Development and Religious Life, exist to promote Bethesda's mission and ministry to and with people who have intellectual and developmental disabilities. Our goal is to increase the awareness of Bethesda's work among congregations and congregational members of all ages, build connections to Bethesda's ministry and the people we serve and ultimately to generate increased financial support of our work. Bethesda Ambassadors accomplish this by:

- Assisting in securing Bethesda Sunday presentation opportunities at local congregations by contacting/meeting with local pastors.
- Conducting Bethesda Sunday presentations at local congregations as a representative of Bethesda. This will include 5-15 minutes before/after church services on an assigned Sunday as well as a longer (30-40 minute) presentation between services, often in place of a Bible study.
- Conduct presentations for adult church groups or Lutheran schools as a representative of Bethesda.
- Represent Bethesda at local church-related conferences or conventions.

#### Who Is Eligible to Become a Bethesda Ambassador?

Bethesda Ambassadors work in all 50 states across the country and are active members of their communities. Pastors, Deaconesses, church leaders and staff and college students are eligible to apply to become a Bethesda Ambassador and bring the message and mission of Bethesda to share with churches in their area. Bethesda Ambassadors share information and updates about Bethesda's work and invite people to become a part of the mission in a variety of ways.





#### The Ordination of Women to the Pastoral Office

Greetings to you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Many denominations ordain women to the pastoral office, even some Lutheran churches. It is important that Missouri Synod Lutherans be able to give a kindly response and explanation to those who may question our position on this issue. We have an opportunity to speak the truth in love.

#### What does God say about women serving in the pastoral office?

The Lord teaches us through His Word that women are not given the responsibility of serving the church as pastors. We read the following statements: "As in all the churches of the saints, the women should keep silence in the churches. For they are not permitted to speak, but should be subordinate, as even the law says ... what I am writing to you is a command of the Lord" (1 Cor.14:33-34,37). "Let a woman learn in silence with all submissiveness. I permit no woman to teach or to have authority over men; she is to keep silent"(1 Tim.2:11-12). "The saying is sure: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task. Now an overseer must be above reproach, the husband of one wife..."(1 Tim.3:1–2). "This is why I left you in Crete ...that you might appoint elders in every town as I directed you, if any man is blameless, the husband of one wife..."(Titus 1:5-6). God has given His church many gifts. Among them is the gift of the office of the public, pastoral ministry. We receive what God gives, in the way He has given it, and in the form He has given it. We do not tell God that His gift is not good enough for us, or that we don't like the form in which He has given the gift. We receive God's gifts as He gives them, with thanks and praise. We rejoice in the opportunities God has given us, as His redeemed people, to serve Him in the church, and in our daily lives. The church which wishes to remain faithful to the Word of God cannot permit the ordination of women to the pastoral office.

#### The Bible says that we are all one in Christ. Don't these words imply that women may serve as pastors?

There are those churches which believe that St. Paul's words in Gal.3:28 mandate the service of women as pastors: "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." But this verse does not teach that there is no distinction

between these various groups; rather, it teaches the equality of salvation that all Christians have in Christ Jesus our Lord. Paul wants us to know that all individuals are equally sinful and equally saved by the work of God through Jesus Christ. Gal. 3:28 does not contradict or overturn St. Paul's comments elsewhere. This passage does not speak to the issue of the ordination of women; instead it is speaking of the equality of our salvation in Christ, for which we praise the Triune God, but it certainly does not mean that all may serve as pastors.

#### If men and women have equal rights, why can't women be pastors?

The issue of the ordination of women is not a matter of "human rights" or "church traditions" or various human opinions and customs. Nor is it a matter of "discrimination against women." Various social reformers in our culture would have us believe that men and women are totally interchangeable and that their Godgiven differences simply have no bearing on life in this world. Not only does this run contrary to the clear testimony of nature, it also contradicts the Bible. The Bible teaches us a different view of God's creation. The Scriptures teach us that both men and women were created in the image of God, but are two distinct and special creations of God. We praise God for His wisdom in creating human beings as both man and woman. We believe that God has gifted men and women with different responsibilities and duties. For example, men are gifted by God to be husbands and fathers; women are gifted by God to be wives and mothers. So also in the church, God has gifted men and women with different, though complementary, opportunities and responsibilities for service.

#### What are the roles of men and women in the church?

Together, men and women serve their Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Men have the divine obligation to be the leaders of the church. Women are called to be of assistance to men in this capacity. An attitude of service guides what we do in the church, not a demand for "rights" or an attitude of "lording it over" one another. We have one Lord and one Master, Jesus Christ. We serve Him in the ways He desires.

#### What About...



#### The Ordination of Women to the Pastoral Office

God has given the responsibility to serve as pastors only to certain qualified men. The church calls these men to serve as representatives of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, in the pastoral office. Women are not called to serve in this way because God has not given this responsibility to women. Why didn't Jesus call a woman to serve as an apostle? Why, through the Apostle Paul, does He prohibit women from serving as pastors in the church? We must leave the answers to these questions to God. We remain with what has been given to us by God in His Word. God has not given the church the option of calling and ordaining women to the pastoral office. We honor and respect God's will in these matters and praise Him for the many gifts He has given us all, including the marvelous opportunities He provides to both men and women to serve Him.

#### Why then do some churches ordain women as pastors?

Here again, as with so many issues, the reason for differences we have with other church bodies is based on their differing attitude toward the Scriptures. Our Synod affirms the truth that the Holy Scriptures are God's perfect and errorless revelation to us. We receive what God has given to us in His Word. We are not free to overlook that Word, ignore it, explain it away, or otherwise disregard what the Lord has revealed through the Apostle Paul. Churches that ordain women have chosen to regard St. Paul's writings as his own personal opinions. This is a difficult position to maintain in light of the fact that St. Paul goes out of his way, on more than one occasion, to repeat his position on this matter, and explicitly declares that this is not merely his personal opinion, but a command of the Lord.

#### How can faithful Lutherans respond to the ordination of women?

First, we never should become defensive or antagonistic about this issue. Instead, we need simply to speak the truth in love, witnessing to our beliefs and recognizing this as yet another opportunity to say, "This we believe, teach, confess and practice."

Second, we need to be loving and gentle with people who belong to church bodies that ordain women. In many instances, they are simply unaware of why this has been done. They have been given incorrect information and

have no clear foundation in Scripture to understand why the ordination of women is contrary to the Word of God. We need to explain these issues in love, with gentleness and compassion. Third, it is important for us to explain how women may serve their Lord in the church in a fulfilling manner. There are many ways for women to serve as full-time church workers in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, including service as teachers, directors of Christian education, directors of Christian outreach, deaconesses and parish nurses. Laywomen have many opportunities for service through various church societies, guilds and leagues, along with the service they provide as volunteer teachers. They have additional opportunities to serve in their local congregations as members of various boards and committees. We thank God for the many blessings and gifts that come to the church through the service of women. We need to emphasize the opportunities that God has provided to all of us, both men and women, to serve Him in His kingdom. How unfortunate it would be if we permitted ourselves to become ensnared in self-centered demands for "rights," and thus take our eyes off of our Lord's call to service. Demanding from God what He has not given is contrary to what it means to be a child of God. When our focus is on love and service to one another, we realize that there is more than enough for all of us to do. We serve each other in love, conforming our service to the Word of God. Nobody in the church is called to be the "master" over anyone else. Pastors are Christ's servants who care for the people of God with Christ's Word and Sacraments. Thus, through these gifts, our Lord graciously gives Himself to us for our salvation, in humble sacrificial service, according to His Father's will. We are privileged to be able to follow Christ's example with thankfulness in our hearts for His many gifts, most importantly the gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation. May God bless our service to Him, for the sake of the Gospel of Christ our Lord.
